Nitrofurantoin is an antibacterial drug that concentrates primarily in urine, which makes it particularly useful for infections of the bladder and other lower urinary tract sites caused by susceptible bacteria. It does not yield any improvement against viral infections.

- Therapeutic class - urinary antibacterial agent commonly used for uncomplicated urinary tract infections.
- Active ingredient - nitrofurantoin, available as several formulations and generic products.

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Visible signs and contexts for its use

Clinicians most often use nitrofurantoin to treat and sometimes to prevent uncomplicated lower urinary tract infections, including acute cystitis, when the infecting organism is susceptible. Because high concentrations occur in urine rather than blood or kidney tissue, it is generally not a first choice for kidney infections or systemic bacteremia.

How the system operates: nitrofurantoin interferes with bacterial enzymes and damages bacterial DNA, producing bactericidal effects against susceptible strains.

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Use instructions and common dosing information

Follow the exact instructions from your prescriber. The information below reflects standard practice patterns in the United States but may not match your personal prescription.

- When using nitrofurantoin, take it with food to enhance absorption and lessen stomach upset.
- Unless advised otherwise, maintain adequate fluid intake.
- Avoid antacids that include magnesium trisilicate during treatment, since they may reduce absorption.
- Complete the entire prescribed course even if symptoms resolve early.
- When you miss a dose, take it when you remember unless it is close to the next scheduled dose; do not double doses.

Examples of regimens commonly used (your prescriber may recommend a different schedule):

- Uncomplicated cystitis - nitrofurantoin monohydrate/macrocrystals 100 mg twice daily for 5 days.
- Older a secondary option schedule - 50 to 100 mg macrocrystals four times daily for 5 to 7 days (less commonly used now).
- Prophylaxis in selected patients - 50 to 100 mg once nightly under medical supervision.

Patients with substantially reduced kidney function often need substitute agents. Ask your clinician about options if you have impaired renal function.

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Storage solution care instructions

- Keep at normal room temperature, approximately 59 to 86 F (15 to 30 C).
- Protect from excess moisture, heat, and direct light; keep the container closed.
- Do not store medications in bathrooms or other damp areas.
- Store where children and pets cannot reach it.

Uses of nitrofurantoin that are not indicated

- Known allergy to nitrofurantoin or to any ingredient in the product.
- At term pregnancy (around 38 to 42 weeks), during labor, or when delivery is imminent.
- Severely reduced kidney function, very low urine output, or obstructed urine flow.
- History of liver injury or jaundice associated with prior nitrofurantoin use.
- Infants younger than four weeks.

Talk with your clinician before taking nitrofurantoin if you have

- Pregnancy, plans for bearing children, or nursing.
- A history of G6PD deficiency, anemia, diabetes, neuropathy, porphyria, or vitamin B deficiency.
- Liver disease, lung disease (including past interstitial pneumonitis or fibrosis), or significant kidney disease.
- Multiple medical conditions, frailty, or use of many other medicines.

Drug collaborative interaction management and other product issues

- Probenecid, a pharmaceutical agent and sulfapyrazone may alter nitrofurantoin pharmacokinetics and are generally avoided together unless specifically recommended.
- Antacids containing magnesium trisilicate can reduce absorption and should be separated from dosing or avoided during therapy.
- Live oral vaccines, such as the oral typhoid vaccine, may be affected by concurrent antibacterial therapy; follow vaccine guidance for timing.

Serious advisories for safety to note

- Neurologic effects - peripheral neuropathy has been reported; seek care for numbness, tingling, or burning sensations.
- Pulmonary reactions - acute and chronic lung problems, including severe reactions, can occur; notify a clinician promptly for fever, cough, breathing problems, or chest pain.
- Hepatic injury - rare cases of severe liver damage have been reported; seek care for jaundice, persistent nausea, or abdominal pain.
- Clostridioides difficile-associated diarrhea and other severe antibiotic-associated diarrhea may develop during or after treatment.
- Urine discoloration - the medicine can turn urine a brownish color; this is usually harmless.
- Older adults - risk of lung and liver unwanted incidental outcomes may be higher; use caution.

Laboratory ongoing monitoring of liver, kidney, and sometimes lung function may be recommended for prolonged courses. Discuss ongoing monitoring plans together with your prescriber.

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Unintended effects to monitor and warning signs to recognize

Many patients tolerate nitrofurantoin without major problems. Mild symptoms often improve as therapy continues. Contact a health professional if undesired reactions are severe, persistent, or unusual.

Standard or mild reactions

- Nausea
- Headache pain
- Flatulence or gas
- Decreased urge to eat
- Light diarrhea

Request urgent medical attention for a potential problem. any of the following

- Signs of a severe allergic reaction such as widespread rash, swelling of the face or throat, difficulty breathing, or intense itching.
- Severe or bloody diarrhea, particularly with high fever and abdominal pain.
- New or worsening breathing problems, persistent cough, chest pain, or unexplained fever.
- Symptoms suggesting liver injury such as yellowing of the skin or eyes, dark urine, or persistent nausea and abdominal discomfort.
- Numbness, tingling, or weakness in the limbs suggesting nerve damage.

This list does not include every possible effect. If you suspect an adverse reaction, contact your clinician or emergency services as appropriate.

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Alternate therapies and related medications

If nitrofurantoin is unsuitable because of allergy, resistance, renal impairment, or infection site, prescribers may select other agents guided by local susceptibility and clinical guidelines.

- Fosfomycin tromethamine (Monurol) - single-dose oral sachet used for uncomplicated urinary tract infection; useful when adherence is a concern.
- Beta-lactams such as amoxicillin-clavulanate or cephalexin - options when the organism is susceptible; dosing frequency and effectiveness vary.
- Trimethoprim-sulfamethoxazole (TMP-SMX, commonly Bactrim or Septra) - often first-line if local resistance is low as well as there is no sulfa allergy.
- Pivmecillinam (Pivva) - a penicillin-type agent available in the U.S. for uncomplicated UTIs; availability and use depend on local formulary decisions.
- Fluoroquinolones (for example, ciprofloxacin or levofloxacin) - generally reserved for cases where other agents are inappropriate due to potential for serious negative adverse outcomes and stewardship concerns.
- Methenamine (hippurate or mandelate) - a urinary antiseptic used for prevention in selected patients; requires acidic urine to be effective.
