Eight Possible Reactions to Nitrofurantoin You Should Know

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Nitrofurantoin constitutes the active ingredient.

Common UK presentations include 50 mg and 100 mg capsules or tablets. A 100 mg modified release product is frequently used for adult treatment courses (one example marketed in the UK is a modified release 100 mg formulation).

Nitrofurantoin belongs to the group of antibacterial medicines that are mainly prescribed for urinary tract infections. In what cases is nitrofurantoin prescribed?

Nitrofurantoin is used to treat uncomplicated lower urinary tract infections such as cystitis caused by bacteria that are sensitive to it. It concentrates in the urine so it is effective for infections limited to the bladder and lower urinary tract.

It is not suitable for infections that have spread beyond the urinary tract, including kidney infections (pyelonephritis), prostatitis, or systemic bacterial infections because the medicine does not reach high concentrations in blood or deep tissues. Nitrofurantoin action and how the the means by which it operates functions

Once taken, nitrofurantoin is absorbed and quickly excreted into the urine where it attains bactericidal levels. It acts by interfering with bacterial enzymes coupled with the genetic material of susceptible organisms, causing damage that prevents bacterial growth and leads to cell death.

Recommended dose and directions

- Follow the prescription you were given exactly and complete the full course even if symptoms improve sooner.
- Take doses with food or milk to reduce stomach upset and to help the body absorb the medicine.
- Maintain adequate fluid intake unless your clinician advises otherwise.
- Avoid taking magnesium trisilicate containing antacids at the same time; ask a pharmacist for compatible antacid options.

For long term preventive use, your clinician may recommend periodic tests of kidney, liver and lung function. If you need guidance about a omitted dose, see [Missed today](#).

Missed dose

- If you remember promptly after the scheduled time, take the dose was not taken as soon as you can.
- If the next dose is almost due, skip the not taking the dose and continue with your normal dosing timetable.
- Do not take a double dose to make up for a forgotten one. Ask a pharmacist or prescriber if you are unsure.

Internal a storage facility serves as a repository for goods awaiting use.

- Store at room temperature, approximately 15 to 30 C (59 to 86 F).
- Keep away from excessive heat, damp and direct sunlight; avoid storing medicines in bathrooms.
- Keep it beyond the reach and out of sight of children and pets.

Interactions with others

- Probenecid, a pharmaceutical agent or sulfinpyrazone can raise blood levels while lowering urinary concentrations, which may reduce effectiveness and increase latent effects.
- Agents that alkalinise urine, such as potassium citrate or sodium bicarbonate, can diminish nitrofurantoin activity by increasing urine pH.
- Always look over everything. with a pharmacist before starting or stopping any prescription, over the counter medicine, herbal product or supplement.

Safety guidelines and warning notices

Do not take nitrofurantoin if any apply to you

- You have had an allergic reaction to nitrofurantoin or any ingredient in the product.
- You are at term in pregnancy (38 to 42 weeks), are in labour or labour is imminent.
- Your kidney function is severely reduced or you have markedly reduced urine output.
- You had jaundice or liver injury after taking nitrofurantoin in the past.
- The patient is an infant under 1 month of age.

Make sure to tell your clinician before starting if you have.

- Pregnancy, plans to try for a pregnancy, or if you are breastfeeding.
- A history of allergies to medicines or intolerances.
- Anemia, diabetes, electrolyte imbalance, G6PD deficiency, liver or kidney disease, peripheral neuropathy, porphyria, or low vitamin B levels.
- Any chronic lung disease such as interstitial pneumonitis or pulmonary fibrosis.
- Advanced age, frailty or other serious long term health conditions.

Safety reminders and important risks

- Vertigo or somnolence may occur. Avoid driving or operating machinery until you know how the medicine affects you. Alcohol content by volume and sedatives can worsen drowsiness.
- Serious lung reactions have been reported, sometimes after prolonged use. Seek urgent medical assessment for fever, chills, chest pain, breathlessness or a persistent cough.
- Severe liver injury has been reported rarely. Seek immediate help if you develop yellowing of the skin or eyes, pale stools, persistent nausea, loss of appetite or upper abdominal pain.
- Peripheral neuropathy is a possible effect, with increased risk when kidney function is impaired or in people with diabetes or vitamin deficiencies. Report any numbness, tingling or burning sensations in hands or feet promptly.

- If you develop severe or persistent diarrhoea, especially with blood in stools, seek medical advice without delay and avoid self treating with anti-diarrhoeal medicines.
- Long or repeated courses can encourage secondary infections; treatment plans should be reviewed if symptoms recur.
- Nitrofurantoin will not treat viral infections such as colds or flu.
- Some patients may notice that urine becomes yellow-brown while taking this medicine; this is usually harmless.
- If you have diabetes, certain urine glucose test strips may be affected; discuss status monitoring with your healthcare team before altering diabetes treatment.
- Monitoring activities of kidney, liver and lung function may be advised during prolonged use, especially for prophylaxis.
- Effectiveness declines and safety concerns increase as kidney function falls. Many UK recommendations advise caution or avoidance if estimated glomerular filtration rate (eGFR) is below about 45 mL/min, though short courses might be considered in selected cases under specialist advice.

During gestation and lactation

- If you discover you are pregnant, discuss benefits and risks with your doctor.
- Do not use nitrofurantoin at term (38 to 42 weeks), during labour or when labour is near.
- Nitrofurantoin passes into breast milk. Do not breastfeed infants under 1 month while taking the drug; for older infants, speak to your clinician about suitability.

Potential adverse outcomes

Many people take nitrofurantoin without problems. When undesired effects do occur they are commonly mild and temporary.

Common, generally mild

- Nausea, wind or mild diarrhoea.
- Pain in the head or decreased hunger.

Serious - seek urgent help

- Severe allergic reactions such as rash, hives, facial or throat swelling, breathing difficulties or hoarseness.
- Severe or persistent watery diarrhoea, abdominal cramps or blood in the stools.
- Symptoms suggesting liver injury or failing liver function such as yellow skin or eyes, pale stools, severe persistent nausea or upper abdominal pain.
- Respiratory symptoms including fever, chest pain, difficulty breathing or an ongoing cough.
- Numbness, tingling or burning in the hands or feet which may indicate nerve damage.
- Bleeding or bruising without an explained cause, marked tiredness or weakness.

This list does not cover every possible adverse effect. Contact a healthcare professional if you have any concerns.

Other medicines with the addition of their equivalents

For uncomplicated lower urinary tract infections, UK prescribers may select among a number of plan B routes depending on allergy history, local resistance patterns, kidney function and culture results.

- Fosfomycin trometamol: often given as a single 3 g dose for uncomplicated cystitis. It is convenient but can be more expensive than nitrofurantoin.
- Trimethoprim: commonly used when local resistance levels are low alongside there are no conditions that contraindicate treatment.
- Pivmecillinam: a penicillin derivative used in many European countries and available in the UK; useful where resistance to other agents is an issue.
- Cefalexin: a cephalosporin sometimes chosen, for example in pregnancy when susceptibility suggests it is appropriate.
- Amoxicillin or co-amoxiclav: generally reserved for infections caused by organisms known to be susceptible because of broader resistance concerns.
- Methenamine hippurate: a urinary antiseptic used for prophylaxis in recurrent infections if urine acidity and patient factors make it suitable.

Non medicine measures such as good hydration, timed voiding and, in selected people, vaginal estrogen or D-mannose may help reduce recurrence. For price comparison

The cost of items in the UK

Private costs vary by brand, pack size, pharmacy and whether any consultation is included. The ranges below are approximate and exclude consultation, dispensing or delivery fees.

- Nitrofurantoin 100 mg modified release (typical short adult course): roughly 5 to 15 GBP for the medicine when purchased privately; some online services offer combined consultation and medicine bundles from about 15 to 35 GBP.
- Trimethoprim (short course): often around 1 to 6 GBP privately.
- Fosfomycin 3 g sachet: commonly 7 to 20 GBP when bought privately.
- Pivmecillinam (short course): about 8 to 25 GBP privately.
- Cefalexin (short course): typically 4 to 12 GBP privately.

On the NHS, prescription charges apply in England as a per item fee (for reference this fee was 9.in the calendar year 2026, 90 GBP. Prescriptions are free at the point of use in Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland. Some community pharmacy schemes allow assessment and treatment of uncomplicated female UTIs by pharmacists under agreed pathways; charges and availability depend on local commissioning.

What is the status of law in the UK?

- Regulatory classification: Prescription Only Medicine (POM). Nitrofurantoin cannot be bought over the counter without a valid prescription.
- Supply routes: available on NHS or private prescription issued by a UK registered prescriber, and in some defined situations via Patient Group Directions or pharmacy-led schemes.
- Online supply: UK online pharmacies and clinics must be registered with the General Pharmaceutical Council and use prescribers and products licensed for UK supply.
- Antimicrobial stewardship: follow prescriber instructions and local guidance to reduce the risk of resistance; incomplete or inappropriate use should be avoided.

- Travel and import: importing prescription medicines is restricted; carry only personal quantities and retain original labels when travelling.
