Central a capsule summary and purpose

Disulfiram, commonly marketed as Antabuse, is a prescription medication used as part of structured programs to prevent relapse in people with alcohol use disorder. It is not a standalone cure for dependence but serves as a pharmacological deterrent that produces an unpleasant reaction if alcohol is consumed while taking the drug.

Best outcomes occur when disulfiram is integrated with counselling, peer support, and regular clinical review. See [Dose and usage instructions](#) for practical use and [Cautions to observe](#) and [Caution: Safety Warning signals and When this should not be used](#) for safety related the facts.

How it operates and typical usage

Disulfiram targets aldehyde dehydrogenase and blocks its activity. When someone who is taking the drug drinks alcohol, acetaldehyde builds up and triggers symptoms such as flushing, rapid heartbeat, nausea, vomiting, chest discomfort and anxiety. This reaction discourages drinking and can support a commitment to total abstinence.

Particulars of the active ingredient

The active compound is disulfiram, a member of the thiuram family. In some technical sources it may be listed as tetraethylthiuram disulfide.

When it has been prescribed

Disulfiram is typically used to help prevent relapse in adults who are committed to remaining abstinent from alcohol and who can reliably avoid all forms of alcohol exposure. Treatment is usually provided alongside psychosocial support and frequent clinical observation and tracking.

Tablet potency options available

Common tablet strengths include 250 mg and 500 mg. Some tablets are scored and can be divided if advised by your prescriber. Availability of branded versus generic products varies by supplier and pharmacy.

Dose details and directions

- Start disulfiram only after at least 12 hours have passed since the last drink. The disulfiram-alcohol reaction can occur for up to 14 days after stopping the medicine.
- Typical initiation schedules include 500 mg once daily for the first 7 to 14 days, then a maintenance dose in the range of 125 to 500 mg once daily. The usual maximum is 500 mg per day, but your prescriber will tailor dosing to your situation.
- Take tablets by mouth with water, trying to dose at the same time each day. Morning dosing is common; if marked drowsiness develops, your clinician may suggest taking the dose at night.
- Supervised dosing - where a partner, carer or pharmacist watches tablets being taken - can improve adherence and is often recommended in supported programs.
- If swallowing is difficult, some formulations may be crushed and mixed with a small amount of soft food or liquid; confirm with your pharmacist that your specific product can be prepared in this way.
- Baseline liver function tests are typically advised before initiation and periodically thereafter, especially in the first few months.
- Use in children is uncommon and should only occur under specialist supervision.

Crucial cautionary measures for safety

- Strict avoidance of alcohol is essential. Do not take disulfiram if you have consumed alcohol within the previous 12 hours, and avoid alcohol-containing products for at least 14 days after the last dose.
- Be vigilant for hidden alcohol in items such as cough syrups, mouthwash, aftershave, some topical gels, hand sanitisers, herbal tinctures, condiments and certain liquid medicines.
- Inform household members and consider carrying a medical alert card or wearing an identification bracelet stating you are taking disulfiram.

- Disulfiram may cause dizziness, drowsiness or fatigue. Avoid driving or operating heavy machinery while affected; see [Driving and work considerations](#).
- If alcohol is consumed and severe symptoms develop - chest pain, severe head pain, breathing difficulty, fainting, confusion or seizures - seek urgent medical help.
- Report symptoms suggesting liver injury such as jaundice, dark urine, abdominal pain or profound tiredness immediately to your doctor.

Note on Use is contraindicated in these cases and Risk warnings

Do not take disulfiram if any of the following apply, unless directed by your clinician:

- Recent alcohol use or anticipated exposure to alcohol-containing products.
- Severe cardiac disease such as advanced coronary artery disease or decompensated heart failure.
- Current psychosis or a history of psychotic illness.
- Acute hepatitis, severe hepatic impairment, or unexplained abnormal liver tests.
- Known allergy to disulfiram, related thiuram compounds, or certain rubber chemicals.
- Metronidazole or paraldehyde usage concurrently.
- An enduring uncontrolled seizure disorder.
- Conditions such as thyroid disease, diabetes, renal impairment or prior brain injury require careful assessment and watchful oversight.
- Pregnancy, planned pregnancy or breast-feeding - discuss additional choices and timing in partnership with your clinician.

Secondary effects and red flags for seeking urgent care

Seek immediate medical care if you experience any of the following serious reactions:

- Allergic symptoms - rash, widespread hives, swelling of the face or throat, or breathing difficulty.

- Signs of liver injury - yellowing of the skin or eyes, dark urine, right upper abdominal pain, marked fatigue or flu-like symptoms.
- Severe changes in mood or thinking - confusion, disorientation, hallucinations or loss of contact with reality.
- Peripheral neuropathy signs - numbness, tingling, burning or weakness in hands or feet.
- Prolonged nausea or persistent vomiting with poor appetite.

More frequent but usually milder effects that may resolve with time include:

- Drowsiness, tiredness or lightheadedness on occasion.
- A throbbing pain in the head.
- There is nausea and occasional vomiting.
- A metallic or garlic-like taste or breath odor.
- Changes in sexual drive or functioning.

Important pharmacologic interacting as a shared activitys are not just about words, but meaning.

Do not fuse these together. disulfiram with the following because of significant risk of adverse symptoms or altered drug levels:

- Beverage with ethanol in any form, including topical or medicinal products containing alcohol.
- Metronidazole or paraldehyde.
- Certain oral solutions such as amprenavir or ritonavir formulations that contain alcohol.
- Sertraline dose oral concentrate and similar alcohol-containing preparations.
- Paclitaxel and some chemotherapeutic agents.
- Tranylcypromine exemplifies a monoamine oxidase inhibitor.

- Isoniazid acts as a cornerstone in TB treatment regimens. for tuberculosis.
- Warfarin and other vitamin K antagonists - disulfiram can increase anticoagulant effect so close INR continuous monitoring is needed.
- Phenytoin is used for seizure control - concentrations may rise; therapeutic surveillance of system activity advised.
- Stimulants and illicit drugs such as cocaine - risk of serious cardiovascular events.

Other medicines that may be affected include some benzodiazepines (for example diazepam), theophylline and substances metabolised by the liver. This list is not exhaustive - always provide your clinician with a full list of prescribed, over-the-counter and herbal products and recreational substances. In the event you miss a dose

If you forget to take a tablet, take it as soon as you remember. If the next scheduled dose is due soon, skip the i forgot to take my dose and continue the normal schedule. Do not try to catch up on a i forgot to take my dose by increasing the dose.

Remember that protective effects do not apply if you have i skipped a doses, together with the risk of an alcohol reaction may persist for days after stopping the medication. See [Basic safety guidelines](#) for timing.

Overdose incident emergency procedures

If there is a suspicion of an opioid overdose, it is an emergency. In Australia call 000 for an ambulance or contact the Poisons Information Centre on 13 11 26 immediately. If it is safe to do so, take the medicine packaging to hospital. Symptoms of an opioid overdose can include severe vomiting, loss of coordination, low blood pressure, marked drowsiness or seizures.

Personal seasonal storage spaces provide room for off-season items. and disposal

- Keep medicines out of reach of kids and animals.
- Store at normal room temperatures, about 20 to 25 degrees C, in a tightly closed container away from light.

- Protect tablets from moisture; keep them in the original blister pack or bottle until use.
- Do not use after the expiry date and ask your pharmacist how to dispose of unused tablets safely.

Options and comparative analysis with an alternate possibility care options

Several other medications and approaches are used to treat alcohol dependence. Choice depends on goals, comorbidities, patient preference and clinical judgement.

- Naltrexone - opioid antagonist available as daily oral tablets (50 mg) or as long-acting injections in some settings. It reduces alcohol reward and cravings and is often used when abstinence is not yet achieved.
- Acamprosate - supports abstinence by modulating glutamate and GABA systems. Typical adult dosing is commonly divided doses; dose adjustments may be needed for renal impairment.
- Baclofen - used off-label in some patients to reduce craving and anxiety; evidence is mixed and dosing varies.
- Topiramate - off-label in this indication; may reduce heavy drinking days and craving for some people.
- Psychosocial therapies - motivational interviewing, cognitive behavioural therapy, relapse prevention planning and support groups are essential components of any pharmacotherapy strategy.

How disulfiram compares:

- Mechanism - disulfiram produces an aversive reaction to alcohol; naltrexone and topiramate blunt reward and craving; acamprosate supports neurochemical balance to maintain abstinence.
- Best fit - disulfiram suits highly motivated people committed to complete alcohol avoidance; naltrexone can be used when patients still drink occasionally; acamprosate suits those working to maintain abstinence.
- Safety - disulfiram requires avoidance of hidden alcohol and periodic liver surveillance of system activity; naltrexone is generally contraindicated in acute liver failure; acamprosate requires renal dosing adjustments.

Price ranges in Australia (approximate)

Prices below are approximate private retail ranges and will vary by brand, pharmacy and pack size. They are not formal quotes.

- Disulfiram 250 mg tablets, pack of 30 - roughly AUD 35 to 80.
- Disulfiram 500 mg tablets, pack of 30 - roughly AUD 60 to 120.
- Naltrexone 50 mg tablets, 30 count - roughly AUD 60 to 150.
- Acamprosate typical monthly supply - roughly AUD 70 to 160.
- Off-label agents such as baclofen or topiramate (generic) - may range from about AUD 10 to 60 per month depending on dose.

Some formulations and manifestations may be subsidised through the PBS for eligible patients. Subsidy status and prices change over time - verify current costs with your pharmacist or the PBS website.

Australia's permission and current legal status for access

- Scheduling - disulfiram is a Schedule 4 Prescription Only Medicine under the Poisons Standard and requires a valid prescription dispensed by a pharmacist.
- Supply - not available over the counter. Electronic prescriptions and telehealth prescribing are generally permitted within current regulations.
- Treatment models - disulfiram is commonly prescribed within supervised programs that include informed consent, counselling and health monitoring.
- Personal importation - the TGA Personalized Importation Scheme may allow individuals to import limited supplies for personal use if they have a valid prescription. Local dispensing is preferred. Always verify up-to-date TGA guidance before importing medicines.
- Driving and work - because disulfiram can impair alertness or coordination, follow workplace safety rules and road laws. Do not drive or operate dangerous equipment if you feel drowsy or dizzy. See [Fundamental essential precautions](#) for more advice.

- Observation - clinicians commonly request baseline and periodic liver tests and may schedule ongoing reviews while you use disulfiram.
