Clonidine hydrochloride is the active ingredient.

Primary use: lowering raised blood pressure. In UK practice clonidine is not usually the first-line option for adults but can be chosen when more commonly recommended agents are unsuitable or poorly tolerated. Examine the other course options section for common first-line classes.

Available forms: most often dispensed as oral tablets. Standard international tablet strengths include 100 microgram (0.1 mg), although specific pack sizes and strengths vary by manufacturer in the UK. Delivery routes: swallowed tablets or, where supplied, skin patches. Standard and off-label uses in the United Kingdom

- Hypertension: used when first-line agents are unsuitable or have caused unacceptable unwanted health consequences.
- Menopausal hot flushes: some clinicians prescribe clonidine when hormone therapy is contraindicated or declined.
- Migraine prevention: used in selected cases by some specialists.
- Withdrawal support: may be used under specialist supervision for symptoms of opioid or nicotine withdrawal.
- ADHD: clonidine is less commonly used than guanfacine in the UK, but it can be considered in specialist settings for certain patients.

How it functions in use

Clonidine modulates brainstem alpha-2 adrenergic receptors. This reduces sympathetic outflow to the heart and blood vessels, producing a fall in peripheral vascular resistance and heart rate, which lowers blood pressure.

Dosing and taking guidelines

- Tablets: typically prescribed once or twice daily according to clinical response and tolerability; your prescriber will tailor the dose.
- Patches (where supplied): apply to clean, dry, hairless skin on the upper arm or torso. Replace weekly and rotate application sites to avoid irritation.
- Do not stop clonidine suddenly. Abrupt withdrawal can trigger rebound hypertension and other symptoms; any dose reduction should be gradual and supervised by a clinician.

Older adults and people with kidney impairment commonly start on lower doses with slower titration. If you are unsure how to take care your medicine, contact your prescriber or pharmacist. Safety rules and guidance

- Do not couple clonidine with alcohol or other sedating medicines when possible because of additive drowsiness and impaired coordination.
- Do not drive or operate heavy machinery until you know how clonidine affects you. It is illegal to drive if a medicine impairs your ability to drive safely; see UK regulation and guidance for lawful action notes.
- Stand up slowly from sitting or lying positions to reduce the risk of faintness or lightheadedness.
- Tell your clinician if you have kidney disease, a history of depression, Raynaud phenomenon, recent myocardial infarction, or bradycardia.
- Keep dosing as regular as possible; missed or irregular dosing, or early removal of a patch, can precipitate rebound high blood pressure.

Inadvisable outward signs and safety cautions

- Hypersensitivity to clonidine or any component of the formulation.
- Severe bradycardia, sick sinus syndrome, or high-degree AV block unless a pacemaker is present.

Take care when using. in severe coronary artery disease, after recent myocardial infarction, in people with significant renal impairment, and in those with severe depressive disorders. Discuss the alternative choice antihypertensive options with your prescriber if these apply to you.

Early warning signs and expected negative effects

Seek immediate medical help for signs of a serious allergic reaction: swelling of the face or throat, difficulty breathing, or extensive rash with hives.

Other commonly reported effects include:

- Xerostomia, drowsiness, dizziness, constipation, tiredness, and head pain sensation.
- Slow heart rate or low blood pressure; palpitations are less common.
- Fluid retention such as ankle swelling or unexpected weight gain.
- Mood changes, confusion, or hallucinations in susceptible individuals.
- Skin redness, itching, or irritation at the patch site when using transdermal systems.

Stopping clonidine suddenly may lead to severe rebound hypertension accompanied by head discomfort, agitation, or a rapid heart rate. If this occurs, seek emergency medical care. Peek at the Overdose tragedy section for urgent advice.

Medication hazards arising from the act of connecting with others

- Central nervous system depressants (including alcohol, benzodiazepines, opioids and sedating antihistamines): increased drowsiness and reduced alertness.
- Tricyclic antidepressants and mirtazapine: may oppose clonidine's alpha-2 mediated effects and reduce its blood pressure lowering.

- Beta-blockers: combined use can substantially slow the heart. If either medicine is to be stopped, do so only with medical advice because stopping clonidine first can cause severe rebound hypertension.
- The drug known as cyclosporine: potential pharmacokinetic interactions among teammates fuel progress. and increased nephrotoxicity risk; monitor carefully if co-prescribed.
- Other antihypertensives: expect additive blood pressure lowering and monitor for symptomatic hypotension.

Private pharmacy prices vary by supplier, location and whether a branded product is chosen. Typical private price tier ranges (approximate):

- Clonidine tablets 0.1 mg, 28 tablets: roughly 3 to 10 GBP for the medicine itself; after dispensing fees total cost to the patient commonly falls between 8 and 20 GBP.
- Transdermal patches (weekly, where available): approximately 10 to 25 GBP per patch depending on supplier and strength.

On the NHS in England most patients pay a standard prescription charge per item (about 9.50 as of 2026, 90 GBP). Prescriptions are free for eligible people in Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland. Prices fluctuate and branded products can be more expensive than generics.

Legal and regulatory considerations for the UK

- Legal status: Prescription Only Medicine (POM). A valid private or NHS prescription is required for supply.
- Regulation: medicines are licensed and monitored by the Medicines and Healthcare products Regulatory Agency (MHRA). Online pharmacies must be registered with the General Pharmaceutical Council (GPhC) and comply with MHRA rules.
- Online supply: reputable online services will require a prescription or a documented clinical assessment before dispensing.
- Personal importation: generally restricted. If importation is permitted it should be for personal use in modest quantities (commonly up to a 3 month supply) and not a controlled drug. Check current MHRA guidance before attempting to import.
- Driving: it is an offence to drive while impaired by a medicine. If clonidine causes sleepiness, dizziness or concentration problems you must not drive.

Care guidance for at risk groups

- Older people: increased sensitivity to blood pressure lowering and sedation; start at lower doses and titrate slowly.
- Renal impairment: effects may be prolonged; consider lower starting doses and closer tracking and monitoring of performance.

- Pregnancy: clonidine is not a first-choice agent in pregnancy; variant options such as labetalol, nifedipine or methyldopa are commonly preferred under specialist expert counsel.
- Breastfeeding: clonidine passes into breast milk in small amounts; discuss risks and a different option choices under the care of your clinician.

Event monitoring essentials and practical tips

- Measure blood pressure and pulse regularly, especially after starting or changing the dose.
- Report a persistently low heart rate or symptoms such as pronounced dizziness, fainting or swelling to your clinician promptly.
- If you are on both a beta-blocker and clonidine, do not stop clonidine first without medical advice because of rebound risk; see Potential drug-possible drug interacting with others with others are the core of collaboration..
- Keep an up-to-date list of all medicines and bring it to appointments to aid intercommunication checks.

FAQs

How quickly does clonidine begin to work? Some reduction in blood pressure can be evident within hours, while the full effect is usually seen over several days as dosing is stabilised.

Should I avoid alcohol if I am taking clonidine? Beverages with alcohol increases sedation and dizziness risk. It is advisable to avoid alcohol or use it with caution, particularly when you are establishing your response to the medicine.

Are patches readily available in the UK? Patch supply varies alongside they may need to be specially ordered. Tablets remain the most commonly dispensed formulation in the UK; check with your pharmacist for current stock.
