High level summary and basic facts

Albendazole is an antiparasitic medication of the benzimidazole group, commonly marketed under brand names such as Albenza and also available as generic preparations. It is used to treat a variety of helminth infections by disrupting the parasite's uptake of glucose, which eventually kills the parasite.

- The active substance in this formulation is albendazole
- Regular clinical uses in the UK: treatment of tissue tapeworm infections (for example, neurocysticercosis and echinococcosis) and selected nematode infections under specialist care
- Common presentation: 400 mg tablets. Some formulations may be suitable for chewing or crushing but check product-specific guidance first

Albendazole dosage information

Take albendazole orally with food and a full glass of water. A fatty meal can increase absorption for some tissue infections; follow the instructions provided by your prescriber.

Important practical points:

- Follow the exact dose, schedule and duration written on your prescription.
- Finish the whole prescribed course even if you feel better before it ends.
- Do not stop therapy or skip doses without medical advice.

Some clinicians may prescribe adjunctive drugs, for example corticosteroids for inflammatory reactions or anticonvulsants if there is a risk of seizures. If you have difficulty swallowing tablets, confirm with your pharmacist whether your specific product can be split, chewed or mixed with food.

Paediatric use: albendazole can be used in children for certain infections, typically from age 2 upwards. Dosing regimen and supervision and monitoring differ from adults and should follow paediatric guidance and support.

Prior to beginning treatment today - what to tell your clinician

Give your doctor or pharmacist a full medical history and a complete list of all medicines and supplements you take. Tell them specifically about any history of:

- Allergy to albendazole, other benzimidazoles (for example mebendazole) or any excipient in the tablet
- Liver disease or abnormal liver blood tests
- Blood disorders such as anaemia or low white cell counts

- Problems with the biliary tract or gallbladder
- A weakened immune system or current severe infection
- Pregnancy, plans to become pregnant or breast-feeding

Counsel on i forgot to take the prescribed doses

When you miss a dose, take it without delay as soon as you remember. If the next scheduled dose is due soon, skip the i failed to take my dose and continue the normal timetable. Do not take extra medication to substitute for a i failed to take my dose.

Clinical the pattern of interactions determines group dynamics. among prescription medications

Several medicines and substances can influence albendazole levels or effects. Tell your clinician about all drugs, herbal products and supplements you use.

- Cimetidine in pharmacology - may affect albendazole metabolism
- Praziquantel, an anthelmintic drug - coadministration may change exposure
- Dexamethasone dose form - often used as an adjunct for inflammatory control but may alter metabolism
- Theophylline - concurrent use may require system monitoring

This list leaves out several items. In addition, food, alcohol and smoking can influence treatment effects. For absorption advice see the dosing information block [Albendazole usage guidelines](#).

Alerts and monitoring and logging

- Clinical review: attend scheduled follow-up appointments and report any new or worsening symptoms promptly.
- Blood real time monitoring: prolonged or repeated courses often require full blood count and liver function tests, typically at intervals such as every two weeks; treatment may be paused if abnormalities are detected.

- Pregnancy prevention: avoid becoming pregnant during therapy and for at least one month after the last dose. Discuss contraception options and testing in dialog with your prescriber.
- Driving and machinery: do not drive or operate heavy machinery if you feel dizzy or drowsy after taking this medicine.
- Beverage that contains ethanol: avoid or limit alcohol while being treated because of potential additional liver strain.

Unforeseen consequences

Please seek urgent medical help if you notice major drug side effect risks.

- Severe allergic reactions such as rash, swelling of face or throat, or breathing problems
- Signs of liver injury: yellowing of the skin or eyes, dark urine, pale stools, abdominal pain
- Unusual bleeding, bruising or signs of bone marrow suppression such as severe tiredness or infections
- New seizures, severe or persistent head ache, or visual disturbance
- Severe skin involvement marked by widespread blistering or peeling.

Common and routine mild effects

- Nausea, vomiting or stomach pain.
- The pain in the head
- Swirling sensation
- Temporary reduction in hair density

If incidental outcomes continue or cause concern contact your healthcare professional. You can report suspected adverse reactions in the UK via the MHRA Yellow Card scheme; ask your pharmacist or visit the Yellow Card website please refer to the details.

Temporary data we require additional storage for our inventory. instructions

- Ensure this is out of reach and out of sight for children.
- Store at room temperature, ideally between 20 and 25 degrees Celsius (68 to 77 degrees Fahrenheit).
- Protect from moisture and keep the container tightly closed.
- Do not keep in bathrooms or near sinks and avoid excessive heat.
- Dispose of unused or expired medication safely; UK pharmacies can advise on take-back schemes.

Price listing and choice variations for the UK

Depending on the species of parasite and clinical situation, an additional choice or additional treatments may be used. Never change therapy without clinical advice.

- Albendazole (generic or brand): in the UK this is often supplied via hospital stock or special-order routes. Private course prices vary widely, approximately from 30 to 200+ GBP depending on dose and duration; under the NHS eligible patients normally pay the standard prescription charge per item in England or nothing in Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland.
- Mebendazole: commonly used for threadworm and some nematodes; over-the-counter single-dose products are inexpensive, typically about 3 to 6 GBP.
- Ivermectin: prescription-only for certain infections; private courses commonly fall in the 20 to 60+ GBP range.
- The antihelminthic drug Praziquantel: first-line for many tapeworm and schistosoma infections; private cost often ranges from about 15 to 40+ GBP.
- Nitazoxanide: used for some protozoal infections and can be less available; prices vary and it may require special ordering.

Price notes: actual costs depend on the dispensing pharmacy, formulation, and length of treatment. In England a private prescription is charged by the pharmacy while NHS prescriptions are subject to the prevailing NHS prescription rules and exemptions.

Status in law of the United Kingdom and practical buying advice

- Albendazole is a prescription-only medicine in the UK. A UK-registered prescriber must assess you and issue a valid prescription where clinically appropriate.
- Some formulations may be provided via hospital supply or obtained as an unlicensed special on a prescribers request; pharmacists can advise on sourcing when justified.
- Off-label use may occur when supported by evidence and clinical judgement; this should be documented and monitored.
- Importation and purchasing online: only use UK-registered pharmacies or reputable services that display valid registration. Importing prescription medicines without meeting MHRA requirements may be unlawful and unsafe.
- Pregnancy and breast-feeding: avoid use in pregnancy unless a specialist determines the benefits outweigh the risks; contraception is advised during treatment and for at least one month afterwards.
- Fitness to drive: you must ensure you are not impaired by negative effects when driving or operating machinery.
